Volleyball England Junior Competitions Review/Consultation – 2022-23 season

Introduction

In the 2021-22 season a major overhaul of the junior competition structure took place, with the competitions at U15, U16 and U18 level changing from a knockout format to a Grand Prix format. Additionally, the competitions were split into two levels Tier 1 (performance), Tier 2 (development). The hoped outcomes were.

- Increased participation (both the number of teams and number of events each team participated in)
- Teams more closely matched (due to tier format and the Gold, Silver...pool system in Tier 1 and development team nature of Tier 2)
- Create a format which had both performance and developmental elements.

In the 2022-23 season these outcomes continued and are the underlying principles of the junior competition structure.

Within this document, you will gain insight into the current progress of our junior competitions and the recommendations for the 2023-24 Junior Competition season intended to build upon the positive trends we have experienced.

This review has looked in detail at the feedback received from all our stakeholders following each Grand Prix (coaches, parents, players, supporters, and referees), from the HUB team, the children and young people group, Volleyball for Life, Talent, and Workforce groups including members direct e-mails to the competitions team. Based on this feedback key areas of success and concern have been highlighted and options put forward for the 2022-23 edition.

Club and Team Entries Analysis

Club and Team Participation Numbers

In term of entries, we can compare 2021-22 data against this year's Junior entries (Appendix A), which is the first year we have been able to collate information from Volley Zone with player registrations and team/club entries to show more accurate results.

The 2021-22 competition attracted 2245 registered players, in 2022-23 we have maintained these figures with 2270. The overall Club Registration has risen from 82 to 91 and the total team entries across all three Grand Prix's and age groups has risen from 894 to 1001.

We have seen a significant increase in the number of clubs competing in the U16 and U18 age groups, especially U16 which increased from 44 to 60 clubs and from 89 teams to 115. In the U18 age group we had an increase from 57 to 68 clubs which has increased the number of players competing from 941 to 1313.

These increases are also shown in the **Tier 1 competitions which increased from 90 teams to 132** which increased the **playing numbers from 973 to 1475**. This was achieved with the same number of clubs participating from 2021-22 to 2022-23 **this suggests more Clubs are entering B and C teams into the Tier 1 competitions.**

We increased the number of teams entering all three Grand Prix and maintained the number above 300 teams even with our drop off for Grand Prix 3.

Age Group Club and Team Entries

In the U15 category there was a significant decrease in clubs participating with player numbers reduced from 1277 to 869. This decrease is also seen in the Tier 2 competitions with a decrease from 75 to 48 clubs participating and the team entries reducing from 280 to 201. This is predominantly the U15 Tier 2 competition with a reduction from 165 boys and 217 girl's teams in 2021-22 to 103 and 179 respectively in 2022-23. There is also a slight reduction in Tier 2 U16 in both genders, but we have seen an increase in Tier 1 teams at U16, this would suggest an increase from participation to performance at U16 and U18 age groups.

The final analysis is the reduction of clubs entering the boys/open category from 75 clubs in 2021-22 to 60 in 2022-23 this has had an impact on the teams entered from 182 to 157. Even though these numbers have decreased the number of boys/open players has increased from 1543 to 1641 in 2022-23. The girl's number has also dropped from 63 clubs to 45 but the team entry numbers have increased from 173 to 205. This would suggest that the increase of Tier 1 and U16 teams would be driven by the increase of Girls teams increasing from participation to performance.

Club and Team Entries Overview

Positive Progress

- Overall Club numbers have increased.
- Overall, Team entries have increased.
- Player participation has stayed the same at 2241 (taken from Volley Zone but may not be 100% accurate) The overall total is higher as not 100% of players registered in T2.
- Number of teams entering the Tier 1 U18, and U16 Boys/Open and Girls competitions have increased.
- The number of teams over the 3 Grand Prix's were higher than 2021-22, even with the natural reduction over the year. Maintain 300+ each GP.

Areas for Consideration

- Club and Team entries dropped in the U16 Tier 2 competition this may be due to clubs moving from participation to performance pathway as T1 teams increased.
- The numbers in U15 Tier 1 were significantly lower than previous years with 16 GP1, to 14 in GP2 & GP3 in 2022-23.
- U15 Tier 2 clubs and teams dropped significantly in both genders across all three Grand Prix's by an average of 18 clubs and decreased by 58 teams across T1 and T2.

Player Participation Analysis

Player Participation

When we look at the participation at each Age Category, we must consider the ages of all participants in each competition (Appendix B). Below is a chart highlighting the number of players in each age group by gender participation.

Breakdown of Player Participation - These figures have been used to collate the 2022-23 Player numbers.

Under 18 Participation figures

The highest participation figures are seen in the U18 competition with an equal number of players in Tier 1 and Tier 2 averaging 386 for Boy/Open and 271 players in the Girl's competition. This brought the average numbers for each Grand Prix to 612 Boy/Open and 412 for the Girl's competition. On each weekend of competition, we had over 1000 players competing in the U18 competitions, most of the players were 17-18 years old with several performance players from the U16 and U15 age groups also playing in the U18 competition.

Under 16 Participation Figures

The U16 participation figures are the 2nd highest within the age groups with again an equal number of players in **Tier** 1 and 2 averaging 242 for Boy/Open and 205 for the Girl's competition. The average number for each Grand Prix is 399 Boy/Open and 366 for the Girl's competition. We therefore had on the U16 weekend 765 players competing.

The participation numbers have increased since 2021-22 but how many players are U16 or younger. When examining the team sheets from the Last 8 competition we found that many teams had U15 players in their squads and that included the semi-finalists at U16. Many teams at U16 have a mixed squad of ages from U15-U16 and many U15 teams are playing in either Tier 1 or Tier 2 in the U16 competitions.

To fully understand the participation numbers for the specific age of the player we would need to examine these DOBs from the start of the season so we could have an accurate breakdown of both the competition numbers and the actual age of participants for each age group.

Under 15 Participation Figures

The U15 participation figures are the lowest of the three age groups within this age group the Girl's participation is higher than Boy/Open players in Tier 1 and 2 averaging 192 for Boy/Open and 243 for the Girl's competition a difference of 51 players. The average number for each Grand Prix is 296 Boy/Open and 370 for the Girl's competition a significant difference of 74 players. We therefore had on the U15 weekend on average 666 players competing in Tier 1 and Tier 2.

The participation numbers have decreased at U15 since 2021-22 from 439 teams to 381 and the number of entries for Boy/Open has dropped on average by 20 teams and the Girls by 13 all of this has had a significant impact on the Tier 1 competition and a smaller impact on the Tier 2 competition.

The Tier 1 competition only had 16 teams enter the competition at GP1, this reduced to 14 teams for the subsequent GP's. This caused problems for GP2 where we had four teams in the Gold and Silver Pool from all corners of the country. We decided to host the two pools in Coventry to reduce the travel time for teams and be fair to all players. This worked well and all clubs agreed it was the best solution. This should be explored for next season and the Tier 1 gold and possibly silver pools. This only occurred due to the low number of entries at the Tier 1 competition. With the introduction of the Tier 2 competition at U16 is there a need for a U15 Tier 1 competition?

When examining the team sheets from the Last 8 competition we found that **most players in the semi-finals had played in the U16 Last 8 competition two weeks before.** The other teams playing in the U15 Last 8 also had many players that had played in the U16 competition or the Last 8 phase.

The number of teams playing in the Tier 2 competition reduced significantly from 2012-22. We still had **over 50 teams** in the Girl's competition and 35 in the Boy/Open competition with some 12 team festivals of volleyball being played. There was a definite divide between North and South teams entering the boy's competition with a bigger spread of teams in the Girl's draw.

The numbers in Appendix C show that we have 191 15-year-olds playing in Tier 1 of the U15 National Competition, out of these players most of them were also playing in the U16 competition. This means that we were doubling up on these players with our time giving 3 weekends to the same group of players. We should look at bringing the U15 and U16 competitions together with a Tier 1, Tier 2 and possibly a Tier 3 4v4 competition if necessary for new developing clubs and therefore we can **concentrate on providing a clear structure for the U14 and below age categories of which we had at least 347 players involved** in the Tier 1 and Tier 2 U15 competitions this year.

By amalgamating the U16 and U15's this will free up 3 weekends of competition to increase the Grand Prix structure of the U18 and U16 competitions and create space for a U14 4v4 regional competition to lead into a National Festival at the end of the year.

Playing Participation Overview

Positive Progress

- The numbers of players have stayed the same between 2012-22 to 2022-23 even with increases in U18 and U16 Tier 1 teams.
- Increase in participation numbers in U16 and U18 competitions.
- Tier 2 competitions continue to produce new clubs and teams in all competitions.
- The use of Volley Zone has allowed us to see the player pathways and breakdown the age participation rates
 against the team sheets that are provided after the Grand Prix. This has allowed us to understand better the
 demographic of the junior competitions and give clear and productive analysis on which to make future
 strategic decisions.
- The U15 competition makes up nearly 50% of the overall number of participants with 1141 registered on Volley Zone out of the total of 2245.
- Tier 2 U15 is attracting more players at 11–14-year-olds in their first experience of volleyball competition.

Areas for Consideration

- The participation pyramid is inverted with the U18 age group being the biggest participants.
- There is a reduction in the U15 competition at both Tier 1 and Tier 2 competitions across both genders.
- Lots of players at U15 are playing in the U16 competition especially the Last 8 phase of the competition, therefore doubling up on competitions.
- Travel times are still big at U16 Tier 2 & U15 Tiers 1 and 2 competitions.
- More teams are needed to sign up to Tier 2 from each region.
- Cost of Tier 2 4v4 U15?
- The amalgamation of U15 & U16 into one competition as we already have an overlap of players, this will free up 3 weekends which will allow us to extend the U18 and U16 competitions and introduce a U14 4v4 regional competition.
- U14 regional monthly competition leading to a national festival at the end of the year.


Performance Overview

Team Performances across Grand Prix Series

When we look at the performance of each team and club at each Age Category, we have created an Overall Ranking System which takes the results of each Tier 1 Grand Prix and ranks each team accordingly. This allows the Competitions Team to organise the subsequent Grand Prix's into ability groups to enhance the standard of competition and gives the players an opportunity to experience a competitive day of volleyball. This encourages participation at all levels of Tier 1 competition and raises the engagement of the clubs and teams throughout the year, this was shown in Grand Prix 3 as the participation did not decrease as in previous years. Appendix D lists the teams and their region participating in the Last 8's of the 2022-23 season.

The table below show the representation of each region in the Last 8's and their conversion rates into the semi-finals and finals.

Performance Club/Region Overview

Positive Progress

- 8 out of the 9 regions were represented in the Last 8 competitions.
- London was the most successful region in the 22-23 season.
- London had the most with 15 teams in the Last 8's with 11 of those making the semi-final stage and 6 the Cup Finals.
- London won three titles with U16 Boys London Sharks and the U16 & U18 Girls Richmond Volleyball Club.
- Eastern produced two winners in the U15 Girls and the U18 Boys competitions with the team from The Boswells School.
- Leeds Gorse from Yorkshire won the U15 Boys competition.
- The North West, West Midlands, London and Eastern provided the majority of the Last 8 teams.

Areas for Consideration

- The North East region had no representatives in the Last 8 competition.
- The North East and South West had no representatives in the semi-final stage of the competition.
- To increase the performance of teams in the other regions out of the top 4 performing regions in 22-23.

We have then looked at the performance of the semi-finalist and the Top 4 on the overall ranking system at each Age Category (Appendix E). We have compared the points difference across all Grand Prix's, their set difference vs matches played and finally the points difference vs sets played. Below are the tables of all the semi-finalists and the Overall Rankings for both genders and age categories.

Performance Overview of the Semi Finalist

Positive Progress

- In most age categories the top two teams were the dominant teams in their age groups by a significant amount.
- The boy's competition was on average more competitive than the girls.
- In the Grand Prix stages Richmond VC Girls are dominant in all girls' categories, with The Boswells School joining them in the U15 and U18 age groups.
- The boy's competition was more even with lots of teams similar in their averages.
- IBB Polonia and The Boswells School dominated the U18 Boys, but the other age groups were more evenly matched.
- Leeds Gorse also dominated the U15 boys with Richmond.
- The averages from 3rd place down to 10th in most age groups were very even with the point difference per set ranging from 0.8 to 4.7. This means most the games were played throughout the season with both teams scoring 20 points per set.

Areas for Consideration

- The need to close the gap between teams in the Cup Final with the other competitors to raise the standard of the Last 8 competition.
- Consultation on why Richmond and The Boswells School are dominating the girl's competitions.
- Increasing the opportunities for the higher based teams to play more competitive games against the same level of competition.
- To use the National Rankings to organise the Grand Prix's earlier in the competition.
- To introduce a bye in the first round of competition to the semi-finalist's teams for the 2023-24 season.

Feedback Analysis

As can be seen in Appendix F, the competition format has continued to receive high satisfaction levels, when looked at, but also when broken down by tier, age group, respondent's role etc. and a high number of positive comments were received regarding the organisation and of the level of competition. Several issues/areas for possible improvement have also been raised/identified and these need to be looked at to improve and develop the format. The evidence points towards further evolution, of a broadly successful structure.

What Went Well

All participants were asked about their feelings on what they felt went well when they competed at a Grand Prix, here is a summary of their responses.

- 'Ran super smoothly, with excellent care from organisers.'
- 'The encouraging atmosphere, the competition between some of the well-matched teams.'
- 'The competition and the opportunity to play other teams and improve myself.'
- 'The girls enjoyed the volleyball, all the coaches were polite, the host was trying their best to make sure
 everything goes smoothly.'
- 'It was well organized. Teams were on time and games were enjoyable.'
- 'Very organised on the day; professionally run; suitable level of opponents.'

- 'At times the competition was not organised too well and that caused confusion, for example which team was on when.'
- 'Earlier notice of location and timings fixture was 80 miles away, so ability to plan a bit more in advance would be great.'
- 'Referees for matches as we felt there was unfair decisions, and some players were refereeing that weren't confident to call out decisions.'
- 'Ensure that the venues provided have courts that can properly accommodate players, at the Leeds competition the 2 courts in use had less than a meter behind them leaving no room for actual serves. No actual officials were provided either, so coaches had to fill in as referees, which lead to obvious bias is some instances.'

In addition to the 'user' feedback it is also important to have observations from HUB team, who were central to organising the competitions. The main points they highlighted were.

• Short turn arounds between each GP – both within an age group and across age groups.

This was a result of the competitions been squeezed into 3 months and entries done on a Grand Prix basis. If the competitions are spread over the season and teams enter at the start of the year for the season. We would then be able to set venues in July for the following season for Tier 1 and the majority of Tier 2, this would reduce the pressure during January and April.

Teams would have more time to plan and know where they will be in the subsequent rounds, this will help schools and clubs in their planning for the Junior events.

This should be eased if the competitions are spread throughout a full season.

If we can encourage Junior teams to enter before the summer holidays, we will know the structure of the Tier 1 competitions and start the Grand Prix in October for some age groups, running through to March 2024.

Difficulties in securing hosts or hosts been able to secure venues.

If teams enter the competition by early September, then we can already have the venues secured for the Tier 1 competitions.

Hosts identified and the venues booked early in June/July 2023. Discussions with clubs who have supported the competitions this season, clubs with access to two court venues. We would look at venues across the country to provide a structure of venues that reduce the distance travelled for teams and can create a more regional competition especially for Tier 2 teams.

Tier 1 Grand Prix 2-4 Gold Pools to be held in the Midlands to reduce the transport for teams, this would be booked by Volleyball England but be hosted by two of the competing teams. Areas being considered at present are Coventry, Kettering, Rugby, and Black Country. This may be extended to Silver Pools if we can secure venues.

The time spent dealing with Volleyzone issues or completing all the Volleyzone entries for T2 clubs.

We are upgrading the online system from Volley Zone to SportLoMo (still to be called VolleyZone) which will make the system of registering more simplistic and therefore will not be a deterrent to new teams, schools, or clubs from registering their players.

Many of the teams are now registered, and this information will automatically be transferred to the new server.

• Development of the upskilling of volunteers to be confident in the roles of referee, linesperson, and scorer.

This should be for parents and players who are asked to complete these roles at Grand Prix's and the Last 8 competitions. The expectation by 2024-25 season is that any person taking on a specific role has been trained in the responsibilities and expectations. As a referee they should hold the Grade 4 referees' qualification (this includes coaches who referee at Grand Prix events) which teaches the participant how to referee, line judge and score a game. The expectation on these volunteers would be to provide their referees affiliation to the Host at the start of the day. The score sheet for games would move from a normal tally chart to a 3 set FIVB score sheet for the Tier 1 competitions at U18 & U16 for the Last 8's 2023-24 season and continue for all Grand Prix events. The current score sheet will remain for all age groups at Tier 2. The upskilling of the Junior players and parents will increase the volunteer network for clubs as they would be able to support the officiating at an appropriate level of their experience.

Producing all the host and entrants' information packs, including results spreadsheets.

The information packs for both hosts and entrants are completed and will only need updating for the 2023-24 season. We have worked on creating result spreadsheets for many different schedule formats especially for Tier 2 competitions. This year if a host would like a specific format for their venue, then we have this available to suit venue timings and number of courts etc.

- Checking and compiling results.
 This will require the same level of work.
- Checking player list/ team sheets against Volleyzone
- It is imperative that all hosts return the team sheets on the Monday after a competition by taking a scan of each sheet and returning them to competitions@volleyballengland.org this is to ensure players were registered and checking for regulation breaches. This also allows us to track the age range of players in each competition and each club's development of teams and players. This will require the same level of work.

The HUB team do however feel, that with the body of work already in place should mean that the workload is eased/reduced. If we can sign teams up before the summer holidays with a deadline of early September, the Tier 1 Grand Prix can be organised with pools and venues for an October start. The booking of Central Venues across the country for both Tiers will mean teams will know where the majority of the Grand Prix's will be held and when the Pools are published, they will be able to organise transport and teams earlier. If the results are processed on the weekend of competition, then we can organise the next pools very quickly.

If U15 & U16 were to be amalgamated, then this would free three weekends for further competition and provide more competition dates for both U16 and U18 competitions. We could then start developing the U14 4v4 competition offer and have more players experiencing volleyball at a younger age.

Proposals for the 2023-24 season

Given the high level of satisfaction recorded and the many positive comments received, any changes for 2023-24 need to be carefully considered so as not to adversely affect those consistent satisfaction levels, although consideration needs to be made at the U18 boys competition, and the U15 Tier 1 and Tier 2 competitions where we have witnessed a significant difference of satisfaction between the genders at U18 and ability categories at U15.

The high level of satisfaction is also supported in the 'areas that could be improved' feedback where the 'nothing/don't know' option was at 13% just below venues (15%) and referees (14).

When looking at the Key Themes in the 'areas that could be improved' some of the issues could be addressed via changes to the competition structure/format, and others by encouraging change via clubs/hosts. There are also some differences in the issues around the T1 and the T2 competitions.

Having analysed and considered the feedback in detail the following issues have been identified as the ones which should be looked at to see if changes can be made to address them (Appendix G). It should be noted that whatever options are selected the competitions will be spread over the period Oct – May

4 main objectives for 2023-24

- 1. **To increase the volunteers** in the Junior section to include coaches, parents, and junior volunteers.
- 2. **To increase the quality and facilitation of competitions at our venues** we use for Junior Competitions, create central venues across all regions and then national HUBS for Tier 1. Invest in Long net systems of 2 court halls to accommodate U14 4V4 competitions.
- 3. To decrease the travelling times for Tier 2 teams and U14 competitions, increasing the participation at regional level for Tier 2 competitions especially U14. Tier 1 VE will look at Central venues to allow fairer travel times/distances and reduce costs for many teams participating in these GP round.
- 4. **To inspire more junior teams to play volleyball**, give more opportunities for recognition of achievements at all levels of participation e.g., Cup Final (Top 8), Shield Final (9-16th), Tier 2 Last 8 and a National Festival of volleyball for U14's.

Examples of financial costs for Tier 1 and Tier 2 Grand Prix's

To understand the financial implications for individual athletes for the 2022-23 junior season and the increase in Grand Prix's for 2023-24 I have created an example of the breakdown costs to a player committing to the National Junior Competition. I have considered entry fees, travel costs, hosting fees and any referee fees that may be included during the season. I have taken a maximum cost from 2022-23 for all these aspects so the Costs Per Grand Prix for a player would be a maximum cost if the player participated in an event (Appendix H).

Race for the Cup

We create a Final 4 weekend for the U15, U16 and U18 competitions, which would include a Semi Final on the Saturday for the U16 & U18 age groups and a final on the Sunday. The U15 competition would be a straight final between the top two teams (semi-final played on the Last 8 date). The facility would need to be a 2-court venue which would accommodate seating and be run at the same level as the Cup Finals.

The event would be a specific weekend of Junior Cup Finals including 24 teams. We would present awards for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places for the teams and award an MVP for each final match. The semi-finals on the Saturday would be the best of 3 sets and the finals on the Sunday would be the best of 5 sets.

How Grand Prix pools are decided - 2022-23 Season.

- 1. Grand Prix #1 U18 and U16 Teams will be seeded into pools based on last year's final rankings. U15 Teams will be placed into geographical pools.
- 2. Grand Prix #2 (including U15's) —Teams will be allocated into ranked pools based on Grand Prix points from Grand Prix #1.
- 3. Grand Prix #3 / Last 8's Teams will be allocated into ranked pools based on accumulated Grand Prix points from Grand Prix #1 and Grand Prix #2
- 4. Teams will be allocated into pools of four where possible. If the entries result in a pool of three or five teams, they will be assigned to the lowest ranked pool.

U18 Tier 1 and Tier 2 (6v6)

The U18 competition will continue the same into the 2023-24 season. The last two years has seen an increase in clubs and teams participating in this age group.

Teams entering Tier 1 will be ranked after the 1st round of matches and then Pools will be organised accordingly. This is a National Competition, and all teams should be willing to travel for their fixtures.

The Last 8 would be extended to include the Last 16. The Last 8 would play for the Cup and the teams ranked 9th-16th would compete for the Shield.

This would mean the Last 16's would run over the two days with Boys on the Saturday and the Girls on the Sunday.

U18 Tier 2

The Last 8 teams would be encouraged to join the Tier 1 competition the following year if U17.

2 suggestions for the end of season

- The Tier 2 competition would also be Nationally Ranked, and we would support a Last 8 competition at a two-court venue for the highest ranked boys /open and girls' teams. This would lead to a Tier 2 Plate/Bowl winner.
- National Rankings for Tier 2 could lead with a final 6-9 at an organised venue, with a conclusion on the day or Tier 2 Plate/Bowl final on a cup final weekend.

Combine the U15 & U16 age groups into Tier 1 and Tier 2 competition of 6v6.

The figures suggest that the U15 age group is playing within the U16 structure. This means that the Junior workforce is doubling up their efforts for the same group of players.

If we join these age groups together it will allow us to develop the opportunities further for these players. By joining the ages together, we can extend the U16 competition to 5/6 dates instead of 3.

We can also extend the U18 competition to more dates to enhance the competition.

With this decision we can concentrate some time to the U14 competition for development of more clubs, teams, and players.

The Grand Prix structure will continue in the same format but over more rounds, therefore the rankings will show a more comprehensive table.

The Last 8 would be extended to include the Last 16. The Last 8 would play for the Cup and the teams ranked 9th-16th would compete for the Shield.

This would mean the Last 16's would run over the two days with Boys on the Saturday and the Girls on the Sunday.

U16 Tier 2

Tier 2 would still be regional, possibly dual region to play different teams, if teams would like to play more Nationally this could be organised if enough teams are willing to travel.

Teams would receive a ranking on performance to show how they have performed against other teams in different pools, this would give them an idea of a National Ranking for Tier 2.

The Last 8 teams would be encouraged to join the Tier 1 competition the following year.

2 suggestions for the end of season

- The Tier 2 competition would also be Nationally Ranked, and we would support a Last 8 competition at a two-court venue for the highest ranked boys /open and girls' teams. This would lead to a Tier 2 Plate/Bowl winner.
- National Rankings for Tier 2 could lead with a final 6-9 at an organised venue, with a conclusion on the day or Tier 2 Plate/Bowl final on a cup final weekend.

U15 Tier 2 Competition of 4v4

Volleyball England will work closely with a Regional Junior Development Officer to deliver U15 regional competitions throughout the Junior season. The Junior Officer would be the intermediate representative to co-ordinate the venues needed for each competition date.

We would facilitate 3 dates over the season for the U15 4v4 where we would encourage these teams to join the Tier 2 Grand Prix's for rounds 4&5.

The Junior Officer will link with Region Clubs to discuss the format they would like across their region e.g., balanced competition, ability, participation, numbers of teams per venue etc.

VE will produce the Pools accordingly and organise the fixtures and result sheets for the host to complete, which will be displayed on the VE website.

The teams competing will be ranked within their region or dual regions.

U14 Tier 2 4v4

Grand Prix #4 & #5 will be for U14 4v4 teams and will be a volleyball festival across England. We will create 4 Regional HUBS that will have a two-sports hall facility to hold an 8 court Grand Prix. Teams will be willing to travel to their closest Region or choose to travel to a neighbouring Region to play different teams.

The weekend will have a boys/open competition on the Saturday and a girl's competition on the Sunday. Medals will be provided for the top three teams for each competition.

The Hub Festivals will be based in the North, Midlands, South East and South West for U14 4v4 consisting of multiple teams from different regions at a central venue. This could have a link to the Volleyball England Futures programme.

The festivals could be arranged into a Tier 1 & 2 competition to balance competition and age ranges that apply to compete.

If demand is high enough, we may be able to facilitate a U13 or U12 specific competition in the same format, this could be played on the weekend of May 11th-12th and the U14 on the 23rd-24th March.

Teams would be encouraged to join the Tier 1 or Tier 2 U16 competition for the 2024-25 season depending on their development within the U14 competition.

Expected Outcomes for the U14 4v4 Competitions.

- More hosts available as the weekends will be focused on 4v4 competition. Venues and hosts identified and booked early in the season, with extra venues added when the need arises.
- VE able to identify and support regions for U14 development through their Get. Keep. Grow. programme, to increase competition, venues, and volunteers.
- Increase the opportunities for U12-U14 2v2-4v4 participation in National Competitions, therefore increasing the confidence of schools and clubs to progress to the U16 and U18 competitions.
- Flexibility of regions to host venues to cater for the demand of teams in their region.
- Development of facilities across the country as identified by regions and VE. VE will look to invest in long net systems for Clubs or schools that support the National Competition Framework.
- Increase the opportunities for participants to play 4v4 in their regions across numerous weekends to reduce the travelling times and increase playing hours.
- Flexibility for hosts to decide on the format of the days schedule to include level of ability, number of teams, playing format or 2s, 3s or 4s.
- Increase in participation at the younger age groups.
- Opportunities to develop young coaches and officials to support the events to increase overall volunteer
- U14 coaches are older Juniors U15-U25 and they are mentored by their head/main coaches during the U14 4v4 Grand Prix's and Regional HUB Festivals.
- Increase in club and participation numbers.
- Encourage schools to participate in locally run events, possible weeknight 90-minute competitions as demonstrated in the 2v2 and 3v3 strategies.

Officiating – to increase volunteers and workforce network.

- All regions to appoint a Junior Development Officer to liaise and work with the VE Office
- All officiating volunteers (1st & 2nd referee, lines person and scorer) all are qualified Grade 4 Referees.
- Volunteers include coaches, players, parents, and any other person asked to fulfil these positions.
- All players develop their scoring skills to be able to complete a FIVB scoresheet to be implemented in the start of the 2024-25 season for U18 & U16 Tier 1 competition.
- Line judge's minimum requirement is to understand the responsibilities and be able to deliver a competent standard of line judging.
- U14 coaches are older Juniors U15-U25 and they are mentored by their head/main coaches during the U14 4v4 Grand Prix's and Regional HUB Festivals.
- The U14 Regional HUB Festivals are refereed, coached, and scored by Junior Volunteers as part of the Volunteer Network.
- Junior Last 16 and Cup Finals are refereed by 25–35 year olds and officiated and scored by anyone 16-25 year olds.

2023-24 Junior Competition Structure - Proposal

The Game Plan Strategy 2023-2028

What success looks like?

Increasing demand and supplying opportunities for players, coaches, and officials to showcase and develop their abilities in optimised competitive settings built on solid standards.

- 1. Clear and aligned pathways for players, coaches, officials, and volunteers that at all levels are built on the premise of maximising member experience.
- 2. A fully integrated and intuitive membership and competition system used at all levels of the sport to effectively and efficiently, manage and develop their services to the Volleyball community.
- 3. An accessible learner management system that provides initial and continual education and development opportunities cascaded through Regions, Counties and Clubs to the Volleyball workforce of coaches, officials, and volunteers.
- 4. An accessible learner management system that provides initial and continual education and development opportunities cascaded through Regions, Counties and Clubs to the Volleyball workforce of coaches, officials, and volunteers.
- 5. An aligned and optimised competition structure that engages, grows, and retains people in the sport and that inclusively ensures that progression into Talent pathways is clear, accessible, and universally supported.

Proposals for the 2023-24 Junior Competition Season

Aims and Objectives 1 - Amalgamate the U16 and U15 competitions to create a U16 Tier 1 and Tier 2.

Pros

- To increase the number of teams in the U16 competition.
- To enhance the competition at Tier 1 U16
- Will increase competition from 15 dates (old format U15-U18) to 20 dates (new proposed format U15-U18).
- The Last 16 final round will optimise the number of teams accessing enhanced pathways to increase players aspirations.
- To create a Cup (1st-8th) and Shield (9th 16th) Finalists.
- Engage more U15 into the 6v6 format of the game and increase performance and participation.
- Create a Tier 2 National Ranking system that allows for a Last 6-8 for the Final round.
- To reduce transport issues at Tier 2
- Reduce the number of days the coaches and volunteers double up on the same athletes, this will allow further developments of the Junior Competitions.

Cons

- Cost will increase due to more Grand Prix dates.
- There will be no U15 Last 8 or Cup Final.
- Next year only the opportunities for Under 15 will reduce by one date if they played in both U16 and U15 in 2021-22.

Aims and Objectives 2 – Increase the 3 Grand Prix's to 4 or 5 Grand Prix's.

Pros

- Increase in the number of competitions for U18-U14
- To increase the length of the season from November to March to October April
- To allow the Overall Standings to be a true reflection over a season with an extra 2 rounds for teams to compete.
- To structure the competition so similar ability teams are playing more performance-based games across the season in Tier 1.
- To allow Tier 2 teams more opportunities to play competitive volleyball in a National Structure.
- To encourage more clubs or schools to commit to a competitive season of volleyball.
- To enhance the offer to U14 4v4 teams in a National Competition framework and to encourage regions to increase their provisions for U14 competition.
- The National Rankings create a higher competitive structure of competition.
- The increase in the Last 8 to Last 16 engages more teams to compete for the Top 16 positions in their specific age group.
- If players are selected for both age groups in their clubs, then they will play between 6 or 8 times a season.
- With an increase in dates means the cost to players remain the same for Tier 1 and Tier 2 Grand Prix players. There could be a decrease in costs and travel, especially for the Last 16 teams.

Cons

- Increase commitment from the coaches and volunteers from 18 days to either 24 (4 GP's) or 30 (5 GP's) in total if you enter all events.
- Costs are going to be different for each club and some will find costs increase due to travelling and costs of home venues, others will see fees decrease.
- Do we have enough facilities and hosts available to support all the pools.

Aims and Objectives 3 - Introduction of a dedicated weekend for U15/U14 - Tier 2 4v4

Pros

- To align, optimise and structure competition that engages, grows, and retains people in volleyball.
- Progression into Talent Pathway is clear, accessible, and universally supported.
- By amalgamating the U16 & U15 age groups allows everyone to focus on starting their volleyball journey or developing their young talent from 4v4 to 6v6.
- By calling this U15 Tier 2 4v4 in 2023-24 will encourage any new teams to enter the National Framework and develop their clubs to join the U16 Tier 2 by Grand Prix 4.
- The Grand Prix caters for U14-U12's and can be flexible to play 2v2, 3v3 or 4v4 dependant on age and standard of entries.
- Pools can be between 4 teams and 12 teams depending on number of entries and facilities.
- The three-year plan would be to make this a U14 4v4 competition with extra days for specific U13 and U12 competitions.
- To develop the regions provision for U14 volleyball, to work closely with a Junior Development Co-Ordinator who will liaise with VE to assess the specific needs of their region and identify areas of support.
- Each Grand Prix will be a stand-alone competition which starts as Regional but could allow teams to enter a neighbouring Pool if they are willing to travel further for varied competition.
- The Final 2 GP's will be in Central HUB Festivals identified by VE. This would consist of a North, Midlands, South East and South West competitions. This will bring together several teams, these festivals are open to anyone to apply who has registered and participated in previous Grand Prix rounds.

Cons

- Regions able to identify and nominate a Junior Development Co-ordinator that will report to VE and be able to collate the regions capabilities and future needs to start September 2023.
- Facilities available to cater for small-sided games and the number of teams entering, a long net system is essential.
- Identify a two-court venue for the regions and for the Central HUB Grand Prix's.
- Not enough entries per region and therefore travel times increase.
- Overall costs to teams will increase with the increase in participation.

Aims and Objectives 4 - Officiating – to increase the volunteer network.

Pros

- To increase the Volunteer Network to support coaches and clubs develop their Junior Provision.
- To develop players, parents, and volunteer's skills in officiating.
- To make sure volunteers who are officiating or scoring Junior Grand Prix's are Grade 4 Referee Qualified
- To teach players how to score a FIVB scoresheet.
- To prioritise the role of officials and the importance of the volunteer roles that allow for Junior Competitions to exist.
- U14 coaches are older Juniors U15-U25 and they are mentored by their head/main coaches during the U14 4v4 Grand Prix's and Regional HUB Festivals.
- The U14 Regional HUB Festivals are refereed, coached, and scored by Junior Volunteers as part of the Volunteer Network.
- These Junior officials will filter into regional and local teams and support the officiating at your clubs' games and develop their understanding and confidence of officiating.

Cons

- Access to grade 4 referee's courses.
- Clubs will need to dedicate a small amount of time to make sure their teams have enough qualified players/volunteers to support the running of the GP's.
- Initial costs to clubs for upskilling their players and volunteers to Grade 4.







Satisfaction Scores

The charts below highlight the overall satisfaction scores for the three main responders' player, parent, and coach with a number in the other category.

There was a large variation between the four groups, with a similar theme to the 2021-22 season with lower player satisfaction in relation to the other areas.



The overall satisfaction across the different Tiers and age groups in general shows very little variation around satisfaction within each competition.



There were three statistically significant scores:

- Women's U18 category with a score of 8.3 vs Boys/Open U18 category with a score of 7.7
- U16 Boys/Open score of 8.2 vs Women's score at 7.9
- U15 Tier 1 score at 7.8 vs Tier 2 score at 8.3


Overall, there were no real trends across the age groups, or tiers.

- The Venue


U18 Age Group

'I liked that all the teams were ready to play and determined to win, which makes me love the volleyball community even more.'




- Large majority of people satisfied to some extent with the 3 topics.

Appendix G

The following issues have been identified as the ones which should be looked at to see if changes can be made to address these concerns and continue development in Junior Competitions

Prime issues for consideration – based on feedback	Suggested solution/options
Time to play more matches	Number of matches played at each individual GP will vary depending upon the time available to the host and the number of teams in a pool. For T2 pools flexibility in the schedule is built in to try and maximise the number of hosts. For T1 pools four teams per court is the ideal, however entry numbers and withdrawals can have an impact on this, next year in T1 all pools will be 4 teams from top to bottom with only the last pool being smaller if needed. More matches can be accomplished by adding a 'round' to the competitions.
Number of sets	This must be flexible in T2, due to booking time, number of teams per pool etc. In T1 matches are three sets, additional sets would make it impossible to run four team pools
Number of teams in pool	In 2023-24 all T1 pool sizes will be four working down the rankings until the bottom pools. Gold, Silver and Bronze pools will be pools of 4 however this may not always possible due to entry numbers and last-minute withdrawals.
Improve venues/facilities	Hosts are provided with a 'great venue' check list. Not mandatory requirements, more of an aspirational list. We appreciate any feedback about specific venues, so we address the situation with the hosts and improve our facilities.
Officiating standards (Refs, scores, line judges)	Encourage teams to qualify club members as Grade 4 referees, to spend some time training their players in officiating duties, to be aware of the young officials pack available from VE and consider using qualified referees (this may be at additional cost to the host/participating teams). See recommendations.
Assigned referees	At present there are not enough active qualified referees for this to be feasible. This would also add additional cost to each GP. The final T1 GP/event will have as a minimum 1 st refs provided by VE, which, in part, is why this GP was/is more expensive.
Tier 1 competitions	T1 is a National Competition so as the competition progresses and if teams of similar levels are pooled together longer distance travel will have to be accepted as a factor of entering the T1 competitions.

More Regional Tier 2 competitions	This will continue to be the goal for T2 GP's, however, is dependent on entries. We will look at creating a Junior development Officer for each region to work closer with the National Office. Some T2 teams also commented that they would like to play different teams, which might increase a team's travel!
Better spectator facilities (viewing/seating, availability of beverages/snacks)	Encourage hosts to consider spectator facilities as part of their hosting plan. Junior events often attract a sizeable number of spectators and hosts may want to consider seating and refreshment sales as a way of raising funds.
Playing facilities (space around courts, nets, referee stands)	Encourage teams to provide the best facilities they can. Some comments on this may be due to the court/hall size, flexibility was given within the rules in order that more clubs could host GP rounds, particularly at T2. This needs to continue to increase the number of possible hosts and development of facilities.
